### REV. GIESELMANN INSTALLED AS PASTOR, FRIEDENBERG CHURCH

On last Sunday Rev. Gieselmann, was was installed as the new Pastor of the Friedenberg Lutheran Church. This pastorate was held until recently by Rev. R. A. Rook, who is now pastor of the Luthean Church at Farrar, Mo.

Rev. A. M. Lohmann, Pastor of the Lutheran Church of this city conducted the installation. He was assisted by Rev. Leopold Dippold, of Longtown, and Rev. Roock, of Farrar. A large attendance witnessed the installation.

Rev. Geiselmann was born in the City of St. Louis, and is a graduate of St. Paul's College, at Concordia, Mo., and received his Theological training at Concordia Seminary, at Springfield, Ill., from which institution he was graduated in the year 1897.

He served as pastor of the congregations at Sweet Springs, Mo., Grand Rapids, Michigan and Pevely, Mo.

## FIRE DESTROYS LUTH. PARSONAGE

Blaze Mar. 17 at Friedenberg Causes Loss in Excess of 5,000.

Fire of undetermined origin destroyed the Lutheran parsonage at Friedenberg, occupied by the Rev. H. Teske and family, about 2 o'clock Tuesday afternoon. The entire structure was consumed. with practically all of the household goods and clothing of the family. The loss is estimated at more than \$5,000.

Rev. Teske was at the Lutheran school nearby when the fire was discovered by one of his children. At this time smoke was coming out of the roof, and a short time later the roof caved in. Only an electric refrigerator, a stove and a few bed clothes were saved.

The Rev. and Mrs. Teske and their eight children are making their home temporarily with varions members of the congregah, but arrangements are being made to move to the old Judge Henry Ochs farm, now owned by Carl Bergman.

The church committee plans to make arrangements this week to build another parsonage at once. The structure which burned Tuesday, a two-story frame, was erected in 1923 at a cost of \$4,700. It was covered by insurance.
